Handicap Notes.....Archie Nakaoka

Why do I have both a Handicap Index and a Course Handicap?

Because courses have varying levels of difficulty. Let's say you have a handicap index of 30.0. At a difficult course you might receive a course handicap So you get four of 34. additional strokes at that course. All courses post a course handicap table so you can compute your course handicap before you play. If you look in your SCGA Directory of Golf you will see the conversion tables. If you do play someone for lunch and would like to insure a fair competitive game, look at the course scorecard. Each hole is assigned a handicap number 1 through 18. If your course handicap is 34, you'll receive 18 holes and an additional stroke on the no 1 through 16 handicap holes.

Handicap Points of Interest

- Average club index is 19.3
- Most improved golfer for the month of June is District Counsel's <u>James</u> Nelson from 17.7 to 15.1

- John Greenwood finally lowered his handicap below 10.0 to 9.6
- Best improvement for their index in the last 12 months is <u>Larry</u> <u>Nelson</u> from 25.7 to 18.6

If you cannot record you score due to the lack of computers or the pro shop closing, you can contact Archie at (213) 576-3844 to have him input you score (s). Keep your score cards so he can verify the score, slope, and course ratings.

This course was built near the Fort Ord army base and relies upon tight fairways and hundreds of trees to make it challenging. The wind came up in the afternoon and the scores skyrocketed from the morning rounds. Victor and Larry continued to walk the course but by the end of the day, Victor was seen hitching rides on various carts. By the end of the round I think everyone agreed that the course won. James Rhodes had his 2nd match with Lou Pacho. The stakes were the same as the first match. Lou will pick up his cookies at the River Ridge tournament. The individual round winner turned out to be Archie Nakaoka with a net 75. Dan Hoshi with a net 76 took 2nd place with Jimmy Henson and Lou Pacho tying for $3^{\rm rd}$ with net 77's. For the fourth straight round Victor walked the course and definitely took home the "Ironman" award for endurance.

We all agreed that we had a wonderful time during this trip and would definitely return should another trip be set up next year.
